EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS: KINDERGARTEN READINESS

- Barren County Schools has seen an increase in scores on the Brigance Screener for incoming students. Across Barren County, 65.3% of students are entering school classified as "kindergarten-ready" compared to 51% of students across Kentucky.
- The Barren River Health Department HANDS
 Program completed around 750 home visits
 utilizing the Growing Great Kids, Growing Great
 Families curriculum. 24 additional families
 joined the program, and 75 developmental
 screenings took place.
- 67 children have been served by the Family
 Enrichment Center Little Learners Program.

 Parent educators have provided 151 home visits in addition to group activities, school activities, meetings, etc.
- The Down Syndrome of Southcentral Kentucky
 I Can! Early Literacy Program has seen great
 improvement in the verbal and sign language
 communication by all program participants.
- Butler County Schools was able to serve 200
 children and parents on the L.E.A.P. Bus,
 a renovated mobile learning center that
 highlights different areas of interest for
 children to help improve kindergarten readiness.

EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS: COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS

- Junior Achievement of Southcentral Kentucky
 was able to serve 1160 students in 48
 classrooms in Allen, Barren, Butler, Edmonson,
 Hart, Logan, Simpson, and Warren counties.
- Forty-three College and Career Ready events
 have already been completed this school
 year (including career shadowing events, WKU &
 SKYCTC college campus visits, college speakers,
 college/career application days, etc.), with
 2,190 Warren County Public Schools students
 participating. Over 700 high school students will
 receive a 6-hour ACT preparatory course to help
 them reach ACT benchmark levels and will be
 given student workbooks provided by United
 Way funding.
- Students at Butler County High School were able to take a high school class as a dual credit course in order to earn college credit funded in part by United Way. (pictured below)







HEALTH HIGHLIGHTS

- The HOTEL INC Street Medicine Program served 137 individuals and provided 705 services. Eleven individuals received direct medical referrals, 41 received housing referrals, and two individuals were provided with medical respite. The Street Medicine Program includes vital checks, triage for medical conditions and treatment, education regarding how to manage their health needs and treatment options, and informing program participants about community services.
- Twenty-one new children were able to receive a
 Court Appointed Special Advocates volunteer.
 In December 2019, there were 27 more
 volunteers than in December 2018 and 60 more
 children were able to be served with a total of
 93 CASAs and 256 children served. Eighty cases
 were able to be closed including adoption,
 reunification, and family placement outcomes.

SAFETY NET HIGHLIGHTS

- HOTEL INC has purchased a home to be used for transitional housing. It can serve 4 individuals of the same gender or a single family. Sixteen participants have graduated from the Preferred Tenant Program during the program's first year. Permanent housing has been obtained for eight people this quarter and 49 households have participated in educational classes and housing navigation.
- 1584 children have been served by the
 Feeding America Backpack Program so far this
 school year in Barren, Butler, Edmonson, Hart,
 Logan, Metcalfe, Monroe, Simpson and Warren
 counties.
