## **EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS**

- The Barren River Health Department HANDS
   Program completed around 1250 home visits to 60 families. Over 75 developmental toys/tools have been distributed in eight counties.
- 63 children have been served at Family
   Enrichment Center Wee Care Childcare Center
   with full-time, part-time or respite care. The
   program has had 48 volunteers providing over
   1058 service hours. All children have received
   Kindergarten Readiness screening.
- The new Down Syndrome of Southcentral Kentucky I Can! Early Literacy Program currently has 3 children enrolled and are attending two days a week. Mckenna Wilson, Music Therapist, is the Kindergarten Readiness Facilitator and Dr. Janice Smith is the Speech Language Pathologist.
- UWSK funding helped The HIVE (Habilitation, Information, Vocation & Education) purchase classroom technology, create a new vocational skills educational program, and provide opportunities to 9 young adults with disabilities to join the workforce or learn skills needed to become career ready.
- The Computer Science/STEM Education
   Program at the Barren County Innovation Zone
   has served 83 students and is on track to serve
   150 by the end of the school year. Twenty-five
   students are developing their professional
   portfolios on Github. 5 program participants, all
   with no prior computer programming
   experience, have been hired part-time.





# EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS (CONTINUED)

- Eleven College and Career Ready events
  have already been completed this school
  year (including career shadowing events,
  college campus visits, college speakers,
  college/career application days, etc.),
  with 747 Warren County Public Schools
  students participating.
- At the Foundry Preschool the youngest students have already met nine of the overall benchmarks and all classrooms are on target for a strong year of learning.

#### INCOME HIGHLIGHTS

- Community Education Hand Up, Hand Back has 26 adults registered for ESL classes. Thirty elementary students are attending tutoring and ten people were placed in local employment. Students in the summer program were able to participate in a Junior Soccer tournament hosted by RefugeBG.
- Edmonson County Skills U has served 19
   students in the first quarter, 80 % of whom are
   GED seeking students. They have partnered with
   the Great Onyx Job Corp in Mammoth Cave,
   KY. Nine GED seeking students have been
   enrolled into the program, three of which have
   obtained a GED.
- United Way funding helped pay for 70 GED test sections to be attempted with 12 graduates receiving test assistance. The SKYCTC Skills U GED Finish Line program served 34 individuals. Two students were able to keep their employment upon GED completion and several other graduates have been referred to the Kentucky Career Center for employment services.

## **HEALTH HIGHLIGHTS**

- Kentucky Legal Aid's Benefits Counseling
   Program staff will be traveling to all 10 counties in the Barren River Area Development District to provide face-to-face counseling for rural, low-income Medicare beneficiaries during the Medicare Open Enrollment Period.
- The HOTEL INC. Street Medicine Program served 137 individuals and provided 705 services. Eleven individuals received direct medical referrals, 41 received housing referrals, and two individuals were provided with medical respite.
- Certified Ombudsman Volunteer Gloria Peach was inducted into the Signature HealthCare of Bowling Green Hall of Fame on November 7, 2019. Ms. Peach has been a volunteer for the Barren River Long Term Care Ombudsman Program for 18 years.

## SAFETY NET HIGHLIGHTS

- Saint Vincent DePaul Food Pantry Program
  was able to serve 185 households with 451
  members. Clients can receive one food box per
  family in a four-week period. Sixty households
  with 147 members received assistance with
  utilities or medicine. Thirty-two households
  with 101 members received clothing vouchers
  to be redeemed at the SVDP Thrift Store.
- HOTEL INC. is in the process of purchasing a home to be used for transitional housing.
   Twelve participants have graduated from the Preferred Tenant Program. Permanent housing has been obtained for 16 people this quarter and over 300 hours of educational classes/housing navigation has taken place.
- HOTEL INC. Manna Mart was able to serve 753
  households with 1699 members. They also
  launched an 8-week pilot project, a Mixed
  Income Fresh Food Cooperative.
- 1039 children have been served by the
   Feeding America Backpack Program so far this
   school year in Barren, Butler, Edmonson, Hart,
   Logan, Metcalfe, Monroe, and Warren counties.
- Habitat for Humanity is currently constructing five town homes for five families. These units include 2- three-bedroom, 2 four-bedroom, and 1 five-bedroom units. There are 29 members in these 5 families, with 19 children and 10 adults. These five families plus two more, for a total of 14 members participated in 8 hours of financial literacy & homeownership training.
